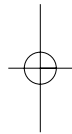

from the Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State

INTRODUCTION

The best kept secret in Britain's new foreign policy is its Chevening Scholarship programme. These clever young people from scores of nations are a new network of influence in a world in which networks rule. I have had the pleasure of introducing Chevening scholars to the Queen and no one should doubt the importance the Chevening programme has. It allows the UK – its public and private faces – to help young men and women gain extra knowledge, an additional qualification, and more insight into the secret wiring of the English language and British values.

The programme is of major benefit to the United Kingdom. I am committed to achieving the Prime Minister's target of expanding the programme by up to 1000 extra scholarships annually by 2005. In 2000-1, the first full year of the Prime Minister's initiative, an additional 285 scholars studied here and the figures for 2001-2 should show a further increase. In a zero one world Chevening produces winners; – amongst scholars who return to make an enhanced contribution to their nation's prosperity and governance; amongst UK universities who get paid to teach Chevening; amongst the sponsoring Departments and firms who make a contact for life.

I am grateful to the Whitehall Departments and Devolved Administrations – the Department for Education and Skills, Ministry of Defence, Department for Trade

and Industry, Trade Partners UK, Office of Science and Technology, Scottish Executive, Department of Health, the Department for Employment and Learning in Northern Ireland, and Lord Chancellor's Department, who have contributed funding for the expansion of the Chevening programme. I should also like to thank the Higher Education Institutions in the UK, who now offer part scholarships to all Chevening scholars. And I wish to give special thanks to our major private sector funding partners: BG, BP, Cable & Wireless, BAe Systems, Diageo, HSBC, ICI, the Open Society Institute, Prudential, Rio Tinto, the Royal Society, Shell, Tate and Lyle, and Vodafone, some of whom have substantially increased their contributions in the past year. I am delighted too that we have forged new partnerships with the Aga Khan Foundation, Canary Wharf, the Garfield Weston Foundation, Canon Collins Educational Trust for Southern Africa, Nottingham University, Barclay Brothers, Royal Holloway, and Scottish Power.

We have made progress in 2000-1. The number of Chevening scholars increased. New partners from Government, the Higher Education Institutions and the private sector joined the programme. We are continuing our efforts to expand Chevening. I am confident that we shall increase numbers again next year, taking us closer to achieving the targets set by the Prime Minister.

OVERVIEW OF YEAR

This was a significant year for the British Chevening Scholarships programme with an increase in the amount of funding available as a result of the Prime Minister's Initiative (PMI) to attract more overseas students to the UK.

Other government departments started to contribute towards the programme during 2000–01 and this was the first year that UK higher education institutions (HEIs) offered part-scholarships for Chevening scholars on standard academic programmes. The Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) also identified a number of new private-sector sponsors under the PMI.

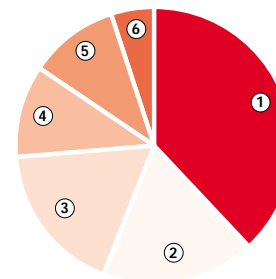
Total British government spending on Chevening scholarships in 2000–01 was £32 million. Of this total around £29 million was spent on the main Chevening programme administered by the British Council and £3 million was spent on jointly funded schemes administered by the FCO, HEIs and other programme partners.

An additional £9 million was raised from co-sponsors. The total funding for the British Chevening Scholarships programme in 2000–01 was therefore approximately £41 million, up from £36 million last year.

There were 1,903 new scholarships administered by the British Council during 2000–01, under the main Chevening programme, compared to 1,627 new scholarships in 1999–2000. There were a further 382 scholarships under the jointly funded schemes thus producing a total of 2,285 new scholarships for 2000–01.

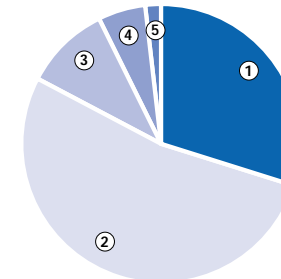
The spread of awards by geographic region can be seen in the pie charts below.

ANALYSIS OF SCHEME

A full list of the number of awards by institution and the number of awards by country can be found in Annexes 1 and 2 at the back of this report.

For the main scheme Chevening scholars are placed at a wide range of institutions throughout the United Kingdom. The choice of institution and subject depends primarily upon the preferences of the scholars. The scholars can seek advice and guidance from a variety of sources including the Education Counselling Service (ECS) and their network of operations overseas or the Training Design Group (TDG) and their network of British Council Associate Advisers in the UK. Many potential scholars also spend time researching courses and institutions on the Internet. For the central joint funded schemes, scholars apply to HEIS and companies that support the scheme.




















China and Hong Kong now have the largest Chevening programmes with a combined allocation of over £2.5 million, which has allowed over 220 scholars to study in the United Kingdom. The China programme looks set to continue its trend of growth into 2001–02 and beyond. The programme has already increased by around eighty-six per cent since 1998–99. Other countries targeted under the PMI include India, Brazil, Japan, Singapore, Malaysia and Russia.

For the main scheme the number of Chevening-funded Ph.D.s and Bachelor degrees continues to fall with Chevening scholarships being awarded primarily for postgraduate degrees and intensive short courses. However, for the central joint funded schemes there is a great deal more variation with scholarships being awarded for research attachments as well as for postgraduate degrees.

The table below shows the number of scholars studying in particular sectors. On the core scheme the sectors of law and human rights and business administration remain extremely popular but the biggest growth area is environmental studies. This has grown from around a 4.5 per cent share of all scholarships (in 1999–2000) to around 8.5 per cent (in 2000–01). Many centrally funded scholars fall within the 'sociology and other social sciences' and 'arts and humanities' categories. These cover a wide range of subjects including theology, psychology, history, geography and philosophy. There is also a relatively high proportion of centrally funded scholars studying 'economics and politics' and 'science and technology' related subjects.

There was a significant increase in sponsorship in 2000-01 as a result of the Prime Minister's Initiative. Chevening is the British government's flagship scholarship scheme and therefore attracts a wide range of sponsors.

UK HEIs contributed around £2 million in 2000-01 to the main programme through part-scholarships amounting to twenty per cent of each postgraduate tuition fee. A number of universities also contributed to specific jointly funded programmes.

Although the FCO provides the bulk of the funds for the Chevening programme, there are other government departments that also contribute to the scheme. These include the Ministry of Defence, Scottish Executive, British Trade International, the Office of Science and Technology, Northern Ireland Executive, Department of Trade and Industry and Department of Health and the Lord Chancellor's Office. A wide variety of other organisations in the UK and overseas also contributed to

the Chevening programme. A full list of co-sponsors is given in Annexe 4.

There are a number of major sponsors of the Chevening programme. HSBC, for example, contribute £250,000 per year to the Chevening programme in Brazil, Argentina, Egypt and United Arab Emirates. Cable & Wireless contribute part-scholarships, primarily in the telecommunications sector, amounting to approximately £500,000 per year. There are major overseas sponsors such as the Korean Ministry of Science and Technology and the Banks Association of Turkey. The Open Society Institute, Shell and the Royal Society are major contributors to a number of jointly funded programmes.

The Chevening programme is an important part of HSBC's commitment to education. This programme facilitates and enhances the qualities of leadership in talented young people and further demonstrates HSBC's involvement in parts of the world where HSBC operates.

COUNTRY PROFILE CHINA AND HONG KONG

'A total of 900 talented Chinese professionals from organisations representing a broad spectrum of China's institutions has benefited from the academic training offered by the Chevening Programme since its inception in 1983. The organisations that are invited to nominate candidates each year are chosen for the key role they play in China's development.'

The Chinese characters of "Zhi Fen Ling", the Chinese rendition of "Chevening", aptly indicate that those who are awarded a scholarship have been recognised for their leadership qualities and their potential to influence opinion. Returned Chevening scholars have continued to make a significant contribution to the development of their organisations and, at the same time, to China's reform and development. I take great pride in the fact that almost all Chevening scholars return to China after their studies, and that they will be among those who help shape China in this new century.'

Each year, the British Embassy and Consulates-General in Beijing, Shanghai, Guangzhou and Chongqing agree a target list of some 300 major partner organisations in the Chinese public and private sector that match the FCO's objectives for bilateral relations and are involved in promoting China's reform agenda. Applications from private individuals are considered but only if they have written support from their employer to participate in the programme. The focus of the Chevening programme in China is to strengthen institutional capacity by developing the human resource of key organisations.

Candidates must achieve at least a 6.5 in the IELTS test. Chosen scholars have a minimum of five years' work experience with managerial, policy-influencing or decision-making responsibilities. They must demonstrate ambition and drive and show commitment to change and organisational development. Priority subject areas include: public and business administration, education, economics, finance, banking, environment, science and technology, law, health, creative industries, international relations and international trade and media.

There is increasing interest in the China Chevening programme from the corporate sector. In 2000-01, £175,000 was secured from organisations such as AstraZeneca, British Aerospace, Thames Water and

Prudential and the Chinese Industrial and Commercial Bank, Three River Gorges Corp. and Supreme People's Procuratorate. A further £113,000 was secured from the scholars themselves towards their tuition fees as the programme sets a ceiling of £10,000 on fees. This has been received positively by the scholars themselves who are willing to invest in their further education.

There are a number of specific jointly funded programmes operating in China. Sponsors include Cable & Wireless, the China-Britain Industrial Consortium with Cranfield University and the University of Warwick, the Chinese Ministry of Finance with China Scholarships Council and Manchester University, and Pearson with Stirling and Cranfield Universities.

There are positive indications that co-sponsorship will continue to rise over the next few years.

Graduates from the Chevening programme now occupy influential positions in the Chinese public and private sectors and are important contacts for Britain. Chevening alumni play an important role in China's economic and social development.

Five hundred Chevening alumni now participate in an alumni association and the network continues to expand. There is an on-line database for alumni which allows members to update their personal data. Future plans for the association

include the establishment of a Chevening Alumni Committee which will be responsible for network development and event management.

The British Embassy and the British Council stay in touch with the alumni through a number of different types of event. The British Ambassador and Consul General host the annual Chevening Graduation Ceremony where alumni are presented with their FCO certificates. Monthly film shows and quiz nights are held at the British Embassy pub in Beijing 'The Bell'. Chevening alumni often get the opportunity to meet senior government figures from the UK or senior commercial visitors. Prime Minister Rt Hon. Tony Blair MP had a successful visit to China in 1998 and met with eighty Chevening alumni at the Royal Observatory in Beijing.

Hong Kong

Hong Kong SAR is a dynamic and vibrant commercial hub in the Asia Pacific region. Its rapidly developing service economy demands high levels of professional competence. Lifelong learning is an important issue for the Hong Kong community. Overseas education, including education in the UK, is highly valued.

The British Chevening Scholarships were launched in Hong Kong in 1996. Over 250 scholarships have been awarded to young professionals in areas including business leadership, finance, journalism, art, architecture and information technology. Most

scholars are in their late twenties. They are selected because of their outstanding academic and professional backgrounds, their strong leadership potential and their commitment to Hong Kong.

In Hong Kong the British Chevening scholarships are already highly regarded. The value of the scholarships has been underlined since 1996 by the active involvement of a board of distinguished local advisers, who play an important role in the promotion of the scholarships, the commissioning of new courses and the selection of scholars. The number of scholarships available each year is increased by the participation of a number of partners and sponsors. These include the University of Cambridge, the S.K. Tang Bequest, John Swire & Sons, Hong Kong Hospital Authority, Cable & Wireless, the Chiang Industrial Foundation, the University of Aberdeen Alumni Association, the University of Leeds, and the Hong Kong Arts Development Council.

The scheme is being shaped continuously to meet the needs of young professionals in Hong Kong. Scholarships for one-year Masters' degrees are balanced by specially commissioned shorter courses for intensive professional development in areas like business leadership, health leadership and journalism.

On return to Hong Kong, scholars are invited to participate in the activities organised by

the British Chevening Scholars' Association. The Association is made up of a group of Chevening returned scholars who are keen to develop a Chevening network in Hong Kong. It was set up two years ago.

Simon Shing-Cheung Fung was awarded a British Chevening Shorter Specialist Scholarship to study for six months on the Reuter Foundation Research Fellowship Programme, University of Oxford in 2000.

He is the Executive Chief Editor of the *Ming Pao Daily News*, a reputable local Chinese newspaper. Simon is a committed journalist with twenty years' continuous professional service. He has worked previously for Radio Television Hong Kong and the *Oriental Daily News*. At Oxford, spent his time researching on-line journalism. Having set up Mingpao.com Limited, he is very interested in developing on-line journalism in Hong Kong as he has a vision of connecting the global Chinese community through the Internet.

Grace Chiu-Man Chow obtained her first-class undergraduate law degree from the University of Hong Kong in 1999. She was awarded a British Chevening scholarship in 2000 to study for a LLM at the University of Cambridge. She has also studied at the University of Toronto for a year as an exchange student. Her goal is to become a successful barrister.

ACTIVITIES AND THE CUSTOMER PERSPECTIVE

The Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) and the British Council work closely together during the year to encourage Chevening scholars to make the most of their period of study in the UK. Regional receptions are organised so that scholars have the chance to meet one another. Scholars particularly value these 'networking' opportunities as they allow them to meet fellow Chevening scholars studying in their region. Some UK higher education institutions host events for international scholars to which British Chevening scholars are invited and they also attend British Council organised events.

Foreign and Commonwealth-hosted receptions this year included:

- on board the Royal Yacht *Britannia* in Edinburgh – hosted by Peter Hain MP (Minister of State, FCO)
- at the Royal Armouries Museum in Leeds – hosted by John Battle MP (formerly Minister of State, FCO)
- at Clare College, University of Cambridge – hosted by David Reddaway (Director of Public Services, FCO)
- at the Oxford University Museum of Natural History – hosted by Rob Holland (Cultural Relations Department, FCO)
- at Cardiff City Hall – hosted by Dr Michael Reilly (Head of Cultural Relations, FCO)

- in Durbar Court at the Foreign and Commonwealth Office, London – hosted by Dr Denis MacShane (Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State, FCO)
- at the National Space Centre, Leicester – hosted by Dr Michael Reilly (Head of Cultural Relations, FCO).

Other events are arranged as appropriate. The forty-eight Indian scholars studying on intensive short courses (print journalists at Westminster; Gurukul scholars at the LSE; environmentalists at IDPM/Bradford; and lawyers at York) all enjoyed an event at the FCO where a lively discussion took place between the scholars and speakers from Cultural Relations, the South Asia Department and BBC World Service and in December 2000 a number of Chevening scholars were invited to attend an event in London hosted by the Foreign and Commonwealth Office and McKinsey & Company, one of the world's leading management consultancies.

Some Chevening scholars are interested in completing short work placements or industrial attachments once their period of study is over. The Scottish International Resource Programme (funded by the British Council, Scottish Trade International and the private sector) regularly provide opportunities for scholars studying in Scotland. When scholars are selected for these placements the FCO contributes towards the costs. The British Overseas Industrial Placement programme, which is funded by British Trade Partners International, offers some placements to Chevening scholars.

The FCO also encourages Chevening scholars to take up the opportunities afforded by HOST, who arrange for international scholars to stay with families

in the United Kingdom for short breaks. In 1999–2000 seventy-six scholars chose to take up the opportunity and this figure increased to 244 in 2000–01.

Contacts, the quarterly Chevening newsletter has a production run of over 10,000 copies, which are distributed to current and former Chevening scholars as well as other interested parties. *Contacts* is also available in an electronic format (at <http://chevening.fco.gov.uk>).

The vast majority of Chevening scholars have a positive view of the time they spend in the United Kingdom. Each year scholars return in-depth questionnaires with feedback on all elements of their experiences of living and studying in the United Kingdom. As can be seen from the statistics their responses are very encouraging with 93.5 per cent rating their academic experience in the UK as 'good' or 'excellent' and ninety-four per cent rating their overall experience of life in the UK as 'good' or 'excellent'. Around seventy-three per cent of scholars said that their perception of the UK had improved as a result of their stay in the UK.

There are a wide range of in-country Chevening related activities that take place around the world each year. Many countries have their own alumni groups that hold regular meetings and events. In Senegal, for example, the British Universities Senegalese Association has an annual gathering which is preceded by a seminar/conference. In 2000–01 the seminar was on the role of English as a tool for development and included a live video-conference link with academics in the UK. Former law scholars in Hong Kong were invited to a reception which the Lord Chancellor visited and there are regular events and seminars to which scholars with a relevant interest are invited.
